Empowering Tamariki At A Time Of Uncertainty


The underlying danger of the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown period is that tamariki and rangatahi, specifically those in areas of high social deprivation, will undoubtedly be harbouring stress and anxiety around how their immediate and distant futures will be affected.

While schools were not operating in levels 3 and 4, our teams had not been able to connect with students on a face-to-face basis, as a result they went beyond the usual call of duty by reaching out virtually through online platforms. Our team worked hard to ensure our tamariki and rangatahi continue to practice resilience and feel supported.

"It's putting all the stuff we talk about into an actual scenario...You can talk about aspects of resilience...but they (the students) are living it now and it will be something they can reflect on as we move on."

2020 Programme Update – Kiwi Can

2020 was all about resilience and respecting themselves, their whanau and local community by practicing overcoming their obstacles through in-school lessons and at home during lockdown.

In October students from Tairangi School learnt and followed the Tikanga around harvesting Harakeke and Toi Toi in preparation for Matariki the Maori new year in our local community. Kiwi Can leaders facilitated and took part in this process engaging the students in the community project. **Students learned about respecting their environment and vibrant culture in their local community.**



2020 Programme Update - Stars

Term 1 saw students take part in four day Stars camp just before lockdown which involved a Marae and cultural activities day, a Surf Life Saving Beach Education programme activity day, and an Adrenaline Forest and Battle Hill Forest Park.

Following the lockdown period we were straight back into it and students took part in a Community Project which is designed to build appreciation for their local community and give something back. Students took part in community projects including making blankets for animals, presenting them to the SPCA Opportunity Shop in Johnsonville, and recording footage for an exercise circuit for the community.

During the Community Adventure students visited local organisations to learn more about how the community operates and what resources are available to them. Some of the organisations included Porirua City Council, the Ministry of Maori Development and the Citizens Advice Bureau.

These activities encouraged development of skills such as:

- **Teamwork and developing pro-social relationships.**
- **Gaining personal confidence and increased self-efficacy.**
- **Developing communication and problem solving.**
- **Setting and achieving short-term goals.**
- **Understanding environmental conservation and sustainability.**




2020 Programme Update – Career Navigator

In 2020 students from Porirua College engaged in activities with an objective to help **expand their minds** on what opportunities are available to them after they finish school.

Career Navigator engages students with work place mentors, work experiences and job skill workshops which give them **real-world advice and ideas** around what they can expect from certain career opportunities once they are ready to leave school.

Relationship building was a huge part of the programme last year with students gaining **confidence** and **positive relationships** through their interactions with their professional mentors.
